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Manifestations of RSD

RSD manifests itself in two main forms: (1) RSD of disuse and (2) RSD secondary to scar formation of peripheral nerves or ephaptic RSD: minor or major causalgia (Table 6).

Trauma is not the most common cause of RSD (see etiology). There are many forms of trauma:

- 1. Blunt trauma (more likely to cause RSD)
- 2. Laceration over waterhed zone (ephaptic RSD)
- 3. Bullet injuries (ephaptic causalgic)
- 4. Electrocution (causalgic and disuse combination)
- 5. Sword or sharp knife injury (ephaptic injury)
- 6. Vibratory damage
 - a. Drilling steel against titanium (disuse)
 - b. Vibration of bullet injury

Locations of injury in the watershed areas include

- 1. Craniocervical (trigeminocervical watershed)
- 2. Dorsum of hand (radial-ulnar-median watershed)
- 3. Dorsum of foot (sural-superficial peroneal-deep peroneal watershed)
- 4. Anterolateral aspect of the knee
- 5. Palmar aspect of the wrist (median-ulnar watershed)
